Comparing foods by protein content gives a similar picture except that grapes and coconut milk are less friendly than beef. That's because you have to eat a lot of both of those to get the protein in one banana, and

you have to eat a lot of bananas to get the same protein as beef. However. not many of us eat bananas and grapes for their protein value.

> Again, almonds come out as the star food creating less than one tenth of the CO2 produced by bananas.

> The authors realize that are limitations there to strict comparisons. Their index does not include water and land use and many foods require transportation to the consumer.

However, the message is the same: staying on the vegetarian side of the banana index is kinder to the planet. That's not new, but the article also mentions that surveys in Europe have shown that consumers are very interested in knowing the CO2 component of their food choices. Maybe one day that will be included on our food labels.




WINTE WASHING THE ROOTS OF DEMOCRACY

The Native American, the original population of North America, is far too often forgotten. Perhaps not so much forgotten as dismissed. Unless you are from an area near a reservation, or that still has Native American names attached to historical places or rivers, the original indigenous population is never brought up. Their major contributions to the concept of Democracy are a well kept secret.


During my formative years, the only Indians I knew were a boy in my elementary school and Tonto (Jay Silverheels), the faithful companion of The Lone Ranger (Clayton Moore). Looking back on it now, I realize that, like other people of color portrayed in the movies and on television, they were shown in a stereotypical way by Caucasians in makeup.

There was no example of a representational government on the continent of the European invaders. The Iroquois Confederacy "The Great League of Peace" founded in 1142 is said to be the oldest living participatory democracy on earth. The other two are the Parliamentary Democracy of Iceland, 1262, and that of the Swiss Cantons (States), 1353.

The Iroquois Confederacy originally consisted of five separate nations: the Mohawk, the Cayuga, the Onondaga, the Oneida and the Seneca. The separate nations which were continually fighting each other were united by two peacemakers who, at a council meeting, brought the Nations together as the Iroquois







Confederacy. Many of the concepts in the U.S. Constitution were taken from the League of Peace. This constitution is recorded and available on a two-row wampum belt.

In 1722, leaders of three British colonies met with representatives of the Iroquois Confederacy to resolve an issue of murder after two white fur traders brutally killed a Seneca hunter. The colonists were afraid of violence but the Seneca were about peace, not war. The Great Treaty of 1722 is never mentioned in the founding documents of the United States. It is the oldest treaty still recognized by the State Department.

In 1744, the Onondaga leader Canassatego gave a speech urging the 13 separate and contentious colonies to unite. The English colonist Benjamin Franklin printed the speech for circulation among the colonies. Again, many of the concepts from the speech, including uniting the separate colonies, were inspired by the Native American.


"Where do we come from? What are we? Where are we going?"*


INFLATION REDUCTION ACT OF 2022

It passed last summer, by one vote in the Senate, and as long as it doesn't get watered down too much (it was a compromise anyway) it will change the way we do business in the USA over the next few decades.

It provides dollars (billions of them) for investment in multiple projects aiming to **improve energy production** and use of wind and solar power. It is particularly geared towards poorer communities which, historically, have suffered disproportionately from lack of services and pollution.

Environmental issues





It should lead to the **air being** cleaner in our cities and on our roads and save American's money!

Many of the dollars are likely to be earmarked for cooperative projects between government and private or grass-root organizations.

However, there are individual incentives/rebates for purchasing electric vehicles and retro-fitting your home for increased energy efficiency and reduced CO2 production.

On **January 1, 1863**, during the Civil War, President Lincoln issued a proclamation to **emancipate all enslaved African Americans.** It wasn't until after the war that this edict took affect throughout the country.

THE EMANCIPATION PROCLAMATION issuance didn't reach Texas until June 19, 1865. The name of the month, June, and the date, the 19th, were combined to form Juneteenth. This date was made a federal holiday by President Biden in 2021.

Called **THE GREAT SCHISM OF 1054**, the final break between the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches occurred. This was a yearlong process which finalized between **June and July 1054 AD**.

In July of 1054 AD, a mysterious light exploded in the sky that was seen around the world. It was documented by Chinese astronomers.

The sky was lit for 23 days and nights.

Today it is called a **SUPERNOVA**, the smoldering remains of a once large star.

Some people cast a long shadow. Others cast a beam of light. We may find ourselves in awe of those who loom so uncommonly large. Others fill us with hope and inspire us to walk tall ourselves, to grow and to do better not only for ourselves

IN THIS TEMPLE
AS IN THE HEARTS OF THE PEOPLE
FOR WHOM HE SAVED THE UNION
THE MEMORY OF ABRAHAM LINCOLN
IS ENSHRING FOREVER

but for and with our fellow human beings together.

When we say the first words of our Constitution, "We the people," we include not only those whom we respect, honor or look up to, but also all those we usually forget, disregard or look upon questioningly. When we repeat the words "We hold these truths to be self-evident that all people are created equal," we do not mean in talent, ability, ambition or in all ways altogether, but as human beings, members of our common

humanity, to whom due respect must be paid. Human rights are not conferred but are inborn. Therefore. our government must necessarily be "of the people, by the people and for the people" all inclusively. The responsibility to conduct and to have a good government of

benefit to all falls upon each of us. To serve honorably and forthrightly is the duty of all of us. We are citizens, not subjects.

What constitutes good government? Is it not one in which all people can live reasonably well off, in good health, with an enriching education?

Our principle of "we the people" does not reach only to our nation's border but to all humankind. Just as Lincoln said that we cannot live in a country "half slave and half free," we cannot live peacefully in a world half slave and half free.

"Atheism is
a lack of belief
in the gods,
not a skepticism, denial, or
refutation of them.

"Some people who describe themselves as atheists also say they believe in a higher power, while others identify with a religion but do not believe in God. And so atheism is complicated to measure. However, according to the Pew Research Center, there are between 450 and 500 million unbelievers worldwide, about 7% of the

global population.

"There is still an opinion that atheists lack morals and must be silent. Compliance is about treating atheists like normal people instead of judging their opinions. "To celebrate ...
one just has to run up and hug
as many disbelievers as
possible. You don't even
have to be a disbeliever to
do this!"

I grew up in Brooklyn NY, an only child, with a sick mother and a disturbed father. My parents, revolutionaries, hoped for a just world — I waited for

justice to prevail at home and abroad!

At 15, a boy said he loved me and, grateful, I married him, dropped out of school, and had four babies before I was 23. I parented as best as a troubled young woman could -- it wasn't

good enough. We five have worked to soften scars, and today we share love, intimacies, travel and adventure — they are my most favorite people and revolutionaries too.

In my thirties, I went back to school, earned my BA, then my MA, and finally my doctorate. I was a tenured professor at the City University of New York, and when I retired, I followed one of my daughters to Florida.

Moving to a new state, a southern state, a slave state, was not easy. I always had a diverse group of friends and relatives and I set out to make that happen in Florida.

The UUFCC was my path. I joined in 2000 – we fell in love with each other. I loved their insistence on justice and they loved my commitment to "forging a better world." But the scope of anti-Semitism that surrounded me

in Charlotte County went unnoticed by most. That invisible feeling stung — the Christmas trees, the "Merry Christmas" greeting, calling the "Fellowship" a "church" stung then and stings now.

I remain a member of UUFCC doing wonderful immigration justice work but have joined a synagogue — it's a progressive Reconstructionist synagogue — it gives me a sense of belonging and it is good for me to sometimes be with my "lansmen."

SWEET POTATO LENTIL CASSEROLE

INGREDIENTS

2 TBS coconut oil ½ yellow onion diced 3 cloves garlic, minced 1" fresh ginger, minced 1 TBS curry powder

1 tsp garam masala

1 tsp cumin powder

1 tsp coriander powder

1 tsp turmeric powder

½ tsp Kashmiri chili powder -or— ¼ tsp cayenne pepper plus more when serving, to taste

1½ tsp salt

1 tsp pepper

1 lg sweet potato, cubed Peeling is optional.

1½ c red lentils, rinsed until water runs clear **– or-** Moong Dal

14-oz can coconut milk, full fat

14-oz can diced tomatoes

11/4 c water

If cooking stovetop, use 1½ to 2 c. Start with less, & add as necessary.

Fresh lime Fresh cilantro







INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Turn IP (Instant Pot) onto HIGH. Sauté, and melt the coconut oil.
- 2. Reduce to medium heat and sauté onions, garlic and ginger. Sweat 10-15 minutes.
- 3. Then put through food processor.
- 4. Once onions are tender, add: curry powder, garam masala, cumin, coriander, turmeric, Kashmiri chili, and salt & pepper.
- 5. Stir to toast about 30 seconds.
- 6. Add sweet potato, red lentils, coconut milk, diced tomatoes, and water. Stir well.
- 7. Cancel sauté setting. Turn IP to pressure cook for 10 minutes.
- 8. Natural pressure release 10 min.
- 9. Season to taste with more salt.
- 10. Serve, garnished with lime and cilantro.

STOVETOP: Use instructions above, but bring lentils to simmer after combining them with the sweet potatoes and liquids. Simmer 20-25 minutes, or until potatoes are tender. Add more water to thin if necessary.

A dollop of sour cream or Greek yogurt on top works well.


