More specifically, all three are in **USDA hardiness zone 10**. USDA rating depends on how cold, not how hot, it gets, and the North Atlantic Current, sometimes known as the Gulf Stream Drift, is warm enough to keep those parts of Northern Europe above freezing in the winter.

Other currents, including the Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation get involved too. It gets very complicated (at least it seemed to when I looked it up on Wikipedia). For some time there has been concern that climate change will slow or completely stop these currents. As the currents conduct warm water northwards, they contribute to glacier melting. The cold water produced sinks under the warmer water and heads south towards Africa and participates in a global ocean current.


However, with the current increase in the rate of glacier melting there is a lot more cold water around which can slow the exchange of warm water for cold water. At first glance it may seem

Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation (AMOC) Part of a global thermohaline circulation in the oceans and is the zonally integrated component of surface and deep currents in the Atlantic Ocean. Characterized by a northward flow of warm, salty water in the upper layers of the Atlantic, and a southward flow of colder, deep waters. https://en. wikipedia.org/wiki/Atlantic_ meridional _overturning_circulation good that there is less warm water moving northward because that could slow glacial melting. Unfortunately, it also means it's going to get colder and drier in Northern Europe, threatening the agriculture of that area, and without the cold water moving southward, it will become warmer in Africa and other equatorial regions.

When is this going to happen?

Well, there is some evidence for slowing of the current over the last 200 years, but no one knows if it will ever completely stop. Estimates vary from never, to sometime in the next century, to before 2030. That's a huge variation and the problem is, as humans, we like the figure that disturbs us least.

So let's put off worrying about it for 100 years. Maybe, for once, we'll be right.



According to the United Nations, 8kg of e-waste per person will be produced worldwide in 2023. That's 61.3 million tons of electronic waste discarded in a year—more than the Great Wall of China weighs. Only 17.4% of that mixture of harmful substances and precious materials will be recorded as being properly collected, treated and recycled globally. The remaining 50.6 million tons will be put in landfill, burned or illegally traded, treated sub-standardly, or simply hoarded in households.

Europe leads the world in e-waste recycling but shows that only 54% of e-waste is collected and recycled.

How did E-Waste Day start? WEEE Forum* started it to raise awareness and highlight the growing issue of electronic waste and promote responsible e-waste management.

What is the INVISIBLE e-waste? Electric/electronic toys, e-cigarettes, power tools, smoke detectors, remote controls, wearables, headphones, smart home gadgets, e-bikes, e-scooters, cables, etc.

SHED LIGHT ON "INVISIBLE" Electronic Waste





Why is invisible e-waste a problem?

- Unused e-devices are wasted when left in drawers and cupboards, rendering lost valuable resources. Re-enter them into manufacturing.
- 2. Unused e-devices contain hazardous substances like lead, mercury, cadmium, and flame retardants, that can leach into soil and water sources, pollute ecosystems, pose risks to humans.

How are they valuable resources? E-devices also contain precious metals

like gold, silver, and copper, and rare and strategic elements also called **Critical Raw Materials** crucial for the green transition and production of new electronic devices. Mining/extracting more *new* resources to make new e-devices contributes to depletion of finite resources and intensifies environmental damage.

The New York Times calls the book a "bold and subversive retelling of the goddess's story," this #1 New York Times bestseller is "both epic and intimate in its scope, recasting the most infamous female figure from the Odyssey as a hero in her own right."

Amazon.com described the book as follows. In the house of Helios, god of the sun and mightiest of the Titans, a daughter is

born. But Circe is a strange child -- not powerful, like her father, nor viciously alluring like her mother. Turning to the world of mortals for companionship, she discovers that she does possess power -the power of witchcraft, which can transform rivals into monsters and menace the gods themselves.

"Threatened, Zeus banishes her to a deserted island, where she hones her occult craft, tames wild beasts and crosses paths with many of the most famous figures in all of mythology, including the Minotaur, Daedalus and his doomed son Icarus, the



THE FLORIDA SKUNK APE



NATIONAL DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH (DVAM) — October 2023

Domestic violence is prevalent in every community, and affects all people regardless of age, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, gender, race, religion, or nationality.

An average of **20 people** are physically abused by intimate partners **every minute**. This equates to more than 10 million abuse victims annually. 1 in 3 women and 1 in 4 men have been physically abused by an intimate partner, and 1 in 5 women and 1 in 7 men have been severely physically abused by an intimate partner.

RED FLAG WARNING SIGNS

- 1. Love at First Sight pressure/push for immediate relationship commitment.
- 2. Love Bomber: extremely affectionate, esp. early on; extravagant gift giver.
- 3. Abusive in previous relationships.
- 4. Into stereotypical gender roles and/or is domineering.
- 5. Constantly jealous, possessive and isolating, keeping you from family, friends and work.
- 6. Two personalities: one others see who's a good person, and another only you see behind closed doors who is angry and aggressive.
- 7. Most emotions are anger, with difficulty conveying other emotions.
- 8. Violent temper, rapid mood changer.
- 9. Cruel to animals or children and insensitive to their suffering.
- 10. Monitors your whereabouts, your activities and/or your spending.
- 11. Won't listen if you say "no" or if you assert boundaries.

DRUMS — TELEPHONE PREDECESSORS?

Drums are part of our heritage and a means of communication. Humans communicate via speech, hands, facial expressions, physical gestures, music, and, yes, drums.

Drums have served as long-distance communication. They've been used in ceremonial and religious functions. Drums motivate the troops. They factor in musical artistic expression and aid in music therapy. Cardio drumming is used in aerobic exercise.

Drum circles originated in the US during the late 1960s and early 1970s as an informal gathering of percussionists and dancers who meet in public for the purpose of playing drums and dancing. Often seen at parks and beaches. The music is improvised and co-created by the participants. The music is a group expression, not constrained by genre, or instrumentation. The music is not directed by one person or subgroup. The Drum Circle is headless (leaderless) and tailless and ageless. A drum circle gathers every Saturday night, one hour before sunset, at Port Charlotte Beach Complex. All are welcome.

Legendary drummers are male and female. John Bonham (Led Zeppelin). Sheila E (Prince). Keith Moon (The Who). Karen Carpenter was a drummer before she gained fame for singing.

To promote the joy, compassion and life-enhancing possibilities of vegetarianism.


Bring awareness to the ethical, environmental, health, and humanitarian benefits of a vegetarian lifestyle.

Meatless Mondays? Veggie-Curious? Vegetarian? Vegan wannabe?


Why should non-vegetarians celebrate Vegetarian Awareness Month too?

- 3. Save money. Animal protein costs more than plant-based food. Added savings may come from health benefits of plantbased diets, & less medical care costs.
- 4. Statistically higher fiber. 25-34g fiber recommended per day. 12-15g typical American daily consumption. Increasing whole grains, legumes & fresh produce helps achieve the goal. 1-pound of beef has zero grams of fiber. 1-cup of lentils has 16 grams of fiber.
- 5. Protect animals. Billions of U.S. animals are slaughtered for human consumption each year. Help protect animals. Go vegetarian during October.
- 6. Respect environment & sustainability. From water protection to soil and air quality, raising animals uses more natural resources than growing plants. Studies show that plant-based diets are more environmentally sustainable than those rich in animal foods.

Diwali comes from the Sanskrit dīpāvali meaning "row or series of lights." The term is derived from the Sanskrit words dīpa, "lamp, light, lantern, candle, that which glows, shines, illuminates or knowledge" and āvali, "a row, range, continuous line, series."

Diwali is connected to various religious events, deities and personalities such as:

- The day Rama returned to his kingdom in Ayodhya with his wife Sita and his brother Lakshmana after defeating the demon king Ravana.
- It is also widely associated with Lakshmi, the goddess of prosperity and Ganesha, the god of wisdom and the remover of obstacles.
- Other regional traditions connect the holiday to Vishnu, Krishna, Durga, Shiva, Kali, Hanuman, Kubera, Yama, Yami, Dhanvantari, or Vishvakarman.

What faiths celebrate Diwali?

Diwali is primarily a Hindu festival. However:

- Jains observe their own Diwali marking Mahavir's final liberation.
- The Sikhs celebrate Bandi Chhor Divas to mark the release of Guru Hargobind from a Mughal prison.
- Newar Buddhists, unlike other Buddhists, celebrate Diwali by worshipping Lakshmi.

 Bangladesh and Hindus of Eastern India generally celebrate Diwali by worshipping the goddess Kali.

How is Diwali celebrated?

- Homes, temples and workspaces are lit with diyas (oil lamps), candles and lanterns.
- Hindus, in particular, have a ritual **oil bath at dawn** on each day of the festival.
- Diwali is marked with fireworks.
- Floors are decorated with rangoli designs.
- Parts of the house are decorated with **jhalars** (long thin strips of colorful fabric).
- Families partakein feasts and sharing mithai. (sweets and desserts).
- The festival is **an annual homecoming** and bonding period not only for families, but also for communities and associations, particularly those in urban areas, which will organize activities, events and gatherings.
- Many towns organize community parades and fairs with parades or music and dance performances in parks.
- Some send Diwali greeting cards to family near and far, occasionally with boxes of Indian confectionery.
- Another aspect of the festival is remembering the ancestors.

How long does Diwali last? Five days.

BURNING AND BANNING — Stephanie Garrett

Throughout world history, there has been a need to control. Rules based on religious beliefs, the need to dictate behavior or to destrov what is not understood have been more common than not. The ability to read and write was provided to royalty, religious scribes, or the very wealthy. Knowledge has been lost because of the need to eliminate the words of others. Books have been burned that were viewed as offensive. The Middle Ages, also known as the dark ages, is an example of censorship to the extreme. Now, in this the 21st century, history is repeating itself.

The cry has been for parental rights to select what is or is not appropriate for children to read. Perhaps you may not want your child to read certain books. But does anyone have the right to dictate or deny what one thinks is appropriate for their child?

The earliest report of book banning in the American Colonies was in 1650. Massachusetts Bay colonist William Pynchon published "The Meritorious Price of our Redemption," a pamphlet that argued that anyone who followed Christian teachings and was obedient to God would get into heaven. This was contrary to Puritan Calvinists' teachings that only a special few were predestined for God's favor. Pynchon's fellow colonists denounced him as a heretic, and burned and banned his pamphlet.

By the 19th century, books denouncing slavery, particularly in the south, were burned and banned. It was also illegal to teach colored slaves to read and write. By 1873, Congress passed the Comstock Act designed to ban both content about sexuality and birth control, widely available by mail order.

Today schools and libraries have become battlegrounds for both fiction and nonfiction books.

Florida accounts for 40% of all books banned in the US.

Books on race, sex or sexual orientation lead the list. Given access to the internet. laws can be skirted by many. However, in more liberal states, banned books, primarily for children, are being made available free of charge at curbside libraries and at a few UU congregations. Knowledge or the ability to check facts is under threat. I remember well the day, many decades ago, when I was able to get my first library card. It meant freedom to explore and faith in the librarian to ensure my selections were age appropriate.

YUMMY VEGAN DOUBLE LAYER CHOCOLATE FUDGE CAKE

Provided by Jeri from **"The Oh She Glows Cookbook" by Angela Liddon.** Alan, who says he aspires to be a vegan but most of the time falls short, claims, "This recipe could convert any meat-eater to veganism!"

INGREDIENTS

2 c non-dairy milk

- 2 TBS apple cider vinegar or white vinegar
- 1½ c natural cane sugar 2/3 c melted coconut oil or grapeseed oil
- 2 TBS pure vanilla extract
- 1 c whole wheat pastry flour
- 2 c all-purpose flour 2/3 c cocoa powder, sifted
- 2 TBS baking soda


1¼ tsp fine-grain sea salt

Frosting ingredients are in paragraph 10.

Adding shaved dark chocolate is optional!

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. Lightly grease 8 or 9 inch pans lined with parchment paper.
- Stir together 2 c non-dairy milk and 2 T apple cider or white vinegar; set aside for 2 min.
- Add: 1 ¹/₂ c sugar, 2/3 c coconut oil, 2 T vanilla (Yes, two tablespoons!) and combine.
- 5. Add 1 c whole wheat pastry flour, 2 c flour, 2/3 c cocoa powder, 2 tsp baking soda, 1¹/₄ tsp salt.
- 6. Beat with mixture until smooth.
- 7. Put in cake pans.
- 8. Bake 30-35 min.
- Let cool for 20-25 min; run knife around edges and invert on cooling rack and cool another 45 min. (This is important or cake will fall apart).
- 10. **CHOCOLATE FROSTING:** ¹/₂ c vegan butter, 2¹/₂ c confectioners sugar, ³/₄ c cocoa powder, pinch of salt, 2 tsp vanilla. Mix together. Add 1 to 2 T (up to 4 T) non-dairy milk, adding only enough to make the frosting thick. After frosting the cake, **refrigerate** because frosting will "melt" otherwise.
