COMMUUNIQUÉ

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CINCO DE MAYO is a holiday that's important for Unitarian Universalists.

Each year, some congregations remember Benito Juarez and the Mexican people and their resistance to oligarchy and imperialism.

This year, the national Unitarian Universalist Association will host a special gathering on May 5th.



BACKGROUND: Benito Juarez was an indigenous person (Zapotec) who became the President of Mexico during the 1850s. He defended human rights. Authoritarians on both sides of the Atlantic Ocean were enraged, and there were arguments, in several places, that democracy and social reforms weren't needed in Mexico. French imperialists arrived in 1862 with plans to establish a monarchy. Powerful people in Mexico endorsed the European invasion.

The French army moved from the Gulf of Mexico towards Mexico City. The invaders were defeated on May 5, 1862. After that, there was a civil war that continued for several years. The reformers defeated the imperialists. The Juarez government remembered its Cinco de Mayo victory.



PRESIDENT'S EXECUTIVE ORDER and our UUA RESOLUTION

The Times They Are A-Changin' (Bob Dylan, 1964). It feels like a world order that came, went away, and is now back in full force. The new world shift is toward one common understanding of acceptance. One understanding of what is good or bad. This need to comply with the defined norm impacts religion, politics, categories of people (disabled, racial groups, sexual orientation, gender, queer).

Then there are the imagined assumptions, not necessarily based on fact, known as truth by the believer.

Initially in this country, the original people and African slaves were thought of as savages, unable to learn, inferior to their European counterparts. The same was true in South America, indigenous people, their religion and culture versus that of the Spanish and Portuguese.

Catholicism and Christianity, the primary European religions of the colonizers, set the rules for who and what was acceptable. Unfortunately, these rules which had been equally applied to most are now being challenged and undone. Primarily in the name of religion, social acceptance is being challenged, without a factual basis, toward the "Other."

I am speaking of the lack of understanding between sex and gender and how they are often defined differently.

As Unitarian Universalists, we affirm the inherent worth and dignity of every person.

There may be discomfort due to lack of contact, and what some terms mean. Educate yourself by reading, having open discussions and inclusion. Same sex male attraction refers to being gay while women are termed lesbian. A straight individual is attracted to those of the opposite sex. Gender and how one relates to the internal sense of being is expressed outwardly.

Our predominant culture dictates that one's biological sex, gender identity and gender expression will align stereotypically. We know this not to be true. Trans people have always been a part of humankind but have only recently taken the leap to be visible.

Our diverse community is now under attack because of perceived differences.

Our predominate culture dictates that there are only two sexes. Trans people are banned from serving in the military. Gender-affirming healthcare has been restricted. Trans athletes can only play in sports aligned with their biological, rather than gender, self. Bathrooms and informative books for children have become an issue. (The children's book for young grades that was at issue depicted a variety of family compositions.)

In 2024, the UUA General Assembly passed a resolution declaring that our religious tradition unequivocally supports the defense and expansion of protections for the Queer community as a matter of faith.

Attorney Richard Patrick is a nationally known employment litigation lawyer, representing companies and individuals in a variety of employment and labor law matters.

His legal career began in the communications practice of a major Washington, D.C. law firm. He's worked as an aide to a U.S. Congressman, and as general counsel to an international exportimport company, among others.

He specializes in litigation and advising small businesses. He developed a significant practice in the areas of corporate/small business counseling, employment and labor law; discrimination and civil rights law, including both trial and appellate litigation; and consumer law.

Mr. Patrick is active in that community, having served on Alexandria City Boards and the Board of Directors of several community organizations. He previously served as Counsel to the Virginia State Conference, NAACP, and was Chair of Virginia Advisory Committee of the United States Civil Rights Commission. Mr. Patrick is a member of the bars of the Commonwealth of Virginia, West Virginia and the District of Columbia, and practices in the federal and local courts of those jurisdictions.

Martha Bireda, Ph.D., is the President of the Blanchard House Museum of African American History of Charlotte County, and a fourth-generation Punta Gordian. She has over 30 years of experience as a lecturer, consultant and trainer. She's also an author and a living history performer.

Dr. Bireda spoke of Punta Gorda as "the little town that unity built." Despite Jim Crow laws, blacks and whites worked together, respectfully. She noted:

April 16, 1862	President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Act freeing those enslaved in the South
May 20, 1865	Florida proclaimed Emancipation in Tallahassee – 11 days after the end of the Civil War
May 17, 2025	Blanchard House Museum Celebrates Reopening; Florida's Emancipation Day; Relocation of Jean Cleveland House; and, Future opening of Florida's 1st cultural Heritage Center

In 2025, the Florida Trust for Historic Preservation identified **"11 to Save"** locations as places important to Florida communities to raise awareness about the need to protect Florida's historic resources, highlight Florida's unique history, and empower local preservationists and community groups.

Blanchard House Museum in Punta Gorda was named one of Florida's **"11 to Save"!**

Spring is upon us.

When I think of Spring, childhood memories come flooding back to a kinder more gentle time in my life.

Elementary School. We learned how to dance around the maypole holding long ribbons, boys moving clockwise and girls counter-clockwise. No one told us where the ritual came from and none of us kids thought to ask.

Spring meant a new suit of clothes including hats for the girls. You wanted to look good at church on Easter Sunday when you stood up to say your Easter poem or Bible verse. This was the Black Baptist Church. Easter Baskets, colored hard boiled eggs, chocolate bunnies, yellow peeps and jelly beans were part of the fare ending with an extended family dinner, usually roast lamb with green mint jelly as the center.

Some cities had Easter Parades, although I don't remember any in my home town. I did hear recently that the Dunbar community in Ft. Myers, Florida, a predominately black community, has had their parade every year since 1944. Over 80 years of tradition. With age, at least for me, comes curiosity, questioning, and then new understanding.

Many Christian practices and beliefs transitioned from ancient recognition of the solar calendar and the season's impact on all life. The practices of pre-Germanic Pagans, today's Wicca, included celebration of Beltane, the spring equinox when day and night are of equal length. It is a time of a new beginning, for plants a resurrection of what appeared to be dead. Flowers, trees and shrubs are reborn, animals, birds and even fish reproduce. I learned that the Maypole dance was initially a fertility rite with the interweaving of masculine and feminine energy. I learned that the name Easter probably came from the pagan Goddess of Spring, Eostre, or Estera. She was associated with bunnies and colored eggs, bunnies being prolific reproducers, and eggs, well you understand. little tweets.
