A SCIENTIST LOOKS AT BELIEF.

A belief is confidence in the truth or existence of something not immediately susceptible to rigorous proof.

What do you believe? And more importantly, why do you believe what you believe?

What does the data support?

To a scientist the better question is:

How many times have you heard: "Don't confuse me with the facts, my mind is made up"? These days, there are so many things being accepted with very little proof, or in most cases, without any proof whatsoever. Conspiracy theories are in this category.

A few years ago, I was teaching a class in critical thinking at a local community college in Indiana. (Critical Thinking is a course that should be taught in every junior high school.) One day I was lecturing about conspiracy theories and misinformation. During the question and discussion period, a student stated that he believed the conspiracy theory that the Clinton's had killed Vince Foster. I saw this as an opportunity, and asked him to thoroughly research this

theory and report 'just the facts' to the class (for bonus credit, of course). The next week he reported to the class the facts surrounding the case. The facts revealed that Vince Foster had indeed committed suicide and that most of the false data that had led to the conspiracy theory had been created by persons who had specific biases against the Clinton's. The student made a

good case against the conspiracy theory. So, after his good report, I asked him if his research had changed his mind. Surprisingly, he said no, he still believed that the Clinton's had a hand in the murder of Mr. Foster. At that point, i recalled that some people still believe the earth is flat. Conclusion: beliefs are very tough things. As an example, if you want to make someone angry, attack their beliefs.

Last year a neighbor dropped by to talk. During our discussion, he stated that Joe Biden had been indicted by the World Court (International Criminal Court [ICC]) for war crimes. I said I had not heard that, and I would think that would be national news. He said that the standard news media was so liberally biased, it would not cover that.

So I immediately took out my smartphone and opened the ICC site. A quick search showed no mention of Joe Biden in either new or pending cases. I asked him why such an important case wouldn't show up in the ICC current case list. He said he didn't know, but he was sure it had happened. I asked where he had heard that news. He said there were sites on the internet he trusted much more than the traditional news media. They would cover stories that the main media wouldn't cover due to their biases. He seemed to get uncomfortable at that point and left soon after.

People tend to hear what they want to hear.

The internet is making that incredibly easy now. This is called confirmation bias. Most of us have it, and it is difficult to overcome.

Authoritarian governments (and well known politicians) know that it is essential to control the information going out to the population. They know that they can shape beliefs with their information. Thomas Jefferson is credited for saying:

"A well informed electorate is the best defense against tyranny."

Therefore, it seems we have somewhat of a logical mandate to be better informed. By the way, becoming better informed in their area of expertise is the objective of every good scientist.

When you hear someone spouting one of the current rampant conspiracy theories or putting out information of questionable nature:

Don't be afraid to really dig down to find the facts and try to find out where the information originally came from.

You may be pleasantly surprised or deeply depressed, but at least you will be better informed. As a caution, also be careful not to immediately reject something out of hand because it sounds implausible. A scientist will correctly say:

Exceptional claims require exceptional proof.

Ignorance of the proof does not necessarily make something untrue. And in some cases exceptional proof may be available.

In conclusion, it is recommended that:


Everyone become more of a scientist, and instead of saying, "I believe that this is true," say,

"The data shows that this is true."





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Twenty-five is an important number for Unitarian Universalists. There will be celebrations at this year's General Assembly in Baltimore. The General Assembly is the national convention for the Unitarian Universalist Association.

The year 1825 was when the American Unitarian Association was established.

By coincidence, the British Unitarian Association was established on the same day in the same year. May 26, 1825. Old ways of thinking about church and state were challenged. On both sides of the Atlantic, the rise of Unitarianism was revolutionary.

William Ellery Channing was the great theologian during the early 1800s who explained Unitarianism. There is one universe and there is one God. God is revealed by reason and in nature. Jesus of Nazareth was a great moral teacher. In some ways, modern Unitarianism resembles the liberal tradition in Judaism and in Islam and in other Abrahamic traditions.

In the year 1925, a grand jury in Tennessee tried to stop the teaching of evolution in public schools. What resulted was the famous "Scopes Monkey Trial." Unitarian leaders like Charles Francis Potter defended civil liberties and modern science. In the process, they explained much of Unitarianism for the twentieth century.

Fast forward to the year 2025.

Spoke to UUFCC on May 25, 2025

On May 25, 2025, Jordan Beutel spoke to UUFCC about the importance of and fight for trans **visibility and authenticity**. He shared how he expresses fear, euphoria, distortion of perception, audacity, and the quest for self-actualization through his poetry. He then shared two of his poems. He said when words cannot express the essence of self-actualization, he turns to art.

Jordan believes that every person has an internal struggle to find their authenticity due to the societal constructs that we are taught to believe. He works to bring visibility to that spectrum of human existence and reminded everyone that their expression is valid because it is theirs.

- "Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature."

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FAIR FOOD PROGRAM (FFP) TO CONSULT IN ADAPTATION OF FFP'S PROVEN PROTECTIONS TO PREVENT BRUTAL LABOR ABUSES EXPOSED IN MUMBAI HIGH COURT, INDIAN PRESS, AND NEW YORK TIMES SERIES

MAHARASHTRA, INDIA — A coalition of labor and human rights groups—coming together under the banner of the newly-formed INDIA SUGAR INDUSTRY WORKERS ASSOCIATION (ISWA)—is launching an ambitious collaboration to end longstanding human rights abuses in India's multi-billion-dollar sugar industry.

Chandan Kumar of India Sugar Industry Workers Association says:

"This partnership will help Indian producers align with global standards and respond to international calls for greater transparency and accountability in supply chains."

The emerging initiative includes several leading grassroots labor organizations representing sugarcane cutters in the key sugar-producing states of Maharashtra, Karnataka, and Uttar Pradesh, which collectively account for approximately 85% of India's sugar production.

The abuses that gave rise to the collaboration — including tens of thousands of women farmworkers subjected to forced hysterectomies and debt bondage arrangements that in some cases stretch across generations – came to light through several recent, high profile legal actions and investigative articles by Indian and international media outlets, including The Hindu and The New York Times.

The labor and human rights groups associated with ISWA are looking to the US-based FAIR FOOD PROGRAM for inspiration as they begin the slow and careful process of designing and building their own initiative to enforce

farmworkers' fundamental human rights in India's sugarcane fields.

CIW Co-Founder Lucas Benitez says:

"We have seen firsthand the unparalleled impact of the FFP in the fields... We look forward to partnering with sugarcane workers in India to help bring that same transformation to India's sugar industry — for the benefit of all, workers, farmers, and corporate buyers alike."

ISWA intends to build a robust WORKER-DRIVEN SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (WSR) modeled program within the Indian sugar industry, empowering sugarcane cutters to serve as frontline monitors of their own rights and, in the process, providing a proven system of human rights due diligence for global brands sourcing from India. ISWA is committed to partnering with international brands to ensure that India's labor laws—particularly those barring forced labor and sexual violence—are implemented in the sugar industry supply chain...

THE MIDPOINT IN THE NORTHERN HEMISPHERE

June is the end of the school year for many. It contains the longest day (June 20, 21 or 22). It contains Father's Day and Juneteenth. June is the midpoint of the growing season between planting and harvesting. Living in Cape May NJ on the Delaware Bay, it is a time for family and friends to compete for time at "our place."

I remember having a teacher-selected reading list in elementary and middle school, which was forgotten until two weeks before Labor Day—the end of vacation time.

UUFCC Book Group doesn't meet over the summer, so I was asked to suggest summer reading picks (that might just interest me) but the following are my recommendations.



1. The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States of America. These are available free in pocket size, through Hillsdale College which can be found online. I think it very important to remember this country's reason for being and why the form of government was designed the way it is. My pocket edition is only 58 pages long. I've found it useful to keep it handy.

- 2. Rescuing The Bible from Fundamentalism (1992) by Bishop John Shelby Spong. Bishop Spong was the Episcopal Bishop of the Newark NJ Diocese when I was a new UU. This book, published in 1991, revealed how literal interpretations of the Bible have been used to justify slavery, deny the rights of gays and lesbians, keep women subordinate, and justify war and revenge. He said he wanted to lift the scriptures out of the prejudices and cultural biases from past eras. It is not a boring theological thesis.
- 3. Yet Here I Am (2025) by
 Jonathon Capehart, a journalist
 for The Washington Post, awarded
 a 1999 Pulitzer Prize for editorial
 writing, (a staff contributor) who
 can be seen on MSNBC. He is a
 gay married African American who
 at age 57 has achieved what
 should have been the impossible
 dream in America.
- 4. Fledgling (2005) by Octavia Butler, an African American science fiction writer who won several awards for her works including the Hugo and Locus, and was the first science fiction writer to receive a MacArthur Fellowship. If you're looking for something really different, what about a 53 year old vampire, a relic of an ancient species. Her survival will depend on whether all humans are bigots ... or all bigots are human.


SWEET POTATO & QUINOA CHILI



INGREDIENTS

- 1 can (15-oz) organic black beans, drained & rinsed
- 1 can (15-oz) organic kidney beans, drained & rinsed
- 2 cans (15-oz) fire roasted organic diced tomatoes
- 1 can (6-oz) organic tomato paste
- 1 pkg (16-oz) frozen fire roasted organic sweet potatoes
- 2 medium size jalapenos finely chopped, seeds removed
- 1 cup dry organic quinoa prewashed
- 1 pkg (10-oz) frozen chopped onion
- 2 TBS minced garlic
- 1½ TBS chili powder
- 1 TBS cumin
- 1 tsp dried oregano
- A few dashes of garlic powder
- A few dashes of onion powder
- 3 level tsp Himalayan salt
- 7 c (56-oz) organic vegetable broth, more as needed

Avocado, cilantro and/or diced onion, for garnish (optional)

DIRECTIONS

- In a large pot, sauté onions, jalapenos and garlic on medium until onions are translucent & start to turn brown (7-10 minutes).
- 2. Add tomato paste, tomatoes and spices. Cook for 2 more minutes, stirring constantly.
- 3. Add broth, beans & sweet potato; stir
- 4. Add quinoa, bring to a boil, reduce heat, cover slightly ajar & cook for 30-40 minutes, stirring occasionally.




